Fitch Upgrades Vestavia Hills, AL's GO Warrants and IDR to 'AAA'; Outlook Stable

Fitch Ratings - New York - 25 Jan 2024: Fitch Ratings has upgraded the following rating for Vestavia Hills, AL:

- --City's Issuer Default Rating (IDR) to 'AAA' from 'AA+';
- --Approximately \$85 million outstanding GO warrants to 'AAA' from 'AA+'.

The Rating Outlook is Stable.

Financial Health & Discipline

The City of Vestavia Hills prides itself in its financial health and discipline. This has been recently recognized by Fitch Ratings and reaffirmed by Moody's Investors Service. Both financial credit rating agencies have rated the City of Vestavia Hills as a AAA credit risk. This is the best rating a municipality can receive. In fact, only one other city in Alabama has two AAA ratings placing the City of Vestavia Hills in a rare and enviable position. In addition, the City was recently awarded the Budget Excellence Award from the Governmental Finance Officer's Association. Between the City's financial strength and use of budgeting best practices, we are well positioned for long term viability in terms of providing services to our residents and withstanding any unforeseen economic challenges. During the recent strategic planning sessions, our City Council placed its highest priority on retaining its financial strength.


Capital Expenditures

In 2018, the City Council in Vestavia Hills made a very important decision when it passed Ordinance 2747. This ordinance increased the City's portion of the sales tax by one cent. After a long series of planning meetings, a very elaborate plan, called the Community Spaces and Infrastructure Plan, was adopted as the primary use of these additional City resources. In the adoption of this funding and expenditure plan, the following three pledges were made along with creation of a separate fund to account for and ensure proper use of the funds:

- 1. Funds would be utilized for debt service associated "Community Spaces" capital expenditures.
- 2. Funds would be utilized for capital needs of the City to include infrastructure projects.
- Funds could be additionally utilized for capital needs of the Vestavia Hills City Schools (VHCS) upon the authorization of the City Council.

As we are well into 2024, our city is celebrating the completion of the Community Spaces and Infrastructure Plan. Vehicle operators and pedestrians are safely enjoying a new road and sidewalk network along Crosshaven Drive. Pet owners are taking great advantage of two new dog parks. Athletes are enjoying new venues while we all enjoy our spectacular new Civic Center. And these are just a few of the improvements.

Given the completion of the plan, our City Council is evaluating priorities to satisfy other community needs to include VHCS while remaining attentive to our financial policies and the needs of our city itself.



Supporting City Schools

During the March 11, 2024 work session of the City Council, Dr. Todd Freeman presented his plans to further the VHCS strategic vision. While resources are limited, he expressed several creative means to accomplish programmatic and safety/security goals. As a means to address safety issues with facilities shared with the City of Vestavia Hills, he asked for the City's commitment to fund a list of improvements at a cost of \$3.5mm over three years. The City Council discussed his priorities and recognized the mutual benefit between both entities. Based upon the completion of the City's Community Spaces and Infrastructure Plan, a future funding commitment in this order of magnitude was deemed feasible by the Council as long as the funding was limited to resources accumulated within the Community Spaces Fund. By doing so, the financial commitment would not present hurdles to addressing other City related capital needs.


Our future success depends on longstanding partnerships that are the cornerstone of Vestavia Hills. It also depends on developing new and creative partnerships that propel our system forward in a way that meets the expectations of our community. Planning for the Future

Vestavia Hills City Schools is planning for the future with a focus on four budget priorities: maintaining a responsible general fund reserve; hiring and keeping the best teachers and staff; maintaining safe, secure and healthy facilities; and delivering profound learning experiences for our students. By law, we are required to maintain a one-month reserve. We estimate finishing the current fiscal year (ending September 30)

Acad with 1.4 months of reserve.

More than half our general fund budget is from local revenue, mostly in the form of property taxes. The 10-year average growth in these local taxes is about 4%. The last two years have been above that average which has allowed us to build our reserve while maintaining a focus on priorities that include optimal class sizes, academic programs and support for teachers. However, this revenue trend will likely not continue. Like all businesses, we must be mindful of revenue trends and increases in expenditures.



City Schools Continues Planning for Facility Improvements

VHCS recognizes the value of maintaining safe, secure and healthy facilities for our students and staff. From 2014-2020, VHCS invested more than \$100 million to add classrooms, cafeterias, libraries and two campuses to accommodate a significant increase in enrollment. This investment has given schools the space needed for the foreseeable future. You can see the 10-year enrollment forecast by visiting www.vhcs.us.



By late fall, through legislative grants and bonds awarded by the state of Alabama in recent years, we will have completed more than \$10 million in improvements to heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC); roofing; and security systems. This leaves an estimated \$35 million of remaining work on HVAC replacements; roof replacements; building envelope and insulation improvements; and water efficiency projects.

Annually, VHCS spends some \$3.5 million in utility costs. Along with the important benefit of creating healthier spaces, the savings from energy efficiency upgrades would be significant. Aging facilities also have general maintenance needs related to plumbing, bathrooms, painting and flooring. We continue to explore long-

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term options for how to best meet these needs.

for school and recreational activities. Recently, the City Council made a commitment to fund \$3.5 million in needed improvements. Beginning this summer and over the course of the next three years, we will replace field turf at Vestavia Hills High School, create a safer driveway to the field at Vestavia Hills Elementary Dolly Ridge, upgrade the Shawntel Dixon Jones track surface and replace gymnasium floors at Dolly Ridge, Vestavia Hills Elementary East, Vestavia Hills Elementary Liberty Park and Louis Pizitz Middle School. This commitment provides for much needed improvements and allows the school system to focus on academic programs and long-term facility needs.



Focusing on Character Education

Vestavia Hills City Schools are exposed to an array of academic opportunities throughout their education. Of equal importance is partnering with parents to instill core values that are cornerstones to their growth.

Vestavia Hills City Schools continues to partner with Samford University's Hope Institute to bring character education to life in our schools. Hope Institute provides Vestavia Hills teachers and school leaders with knowledge and resources to create core values — the traits and virtues one would want every child to possess as they leave school and enter the real world. These core values, such as "The West Way: Kindness, Respect and Responsibility" at Vestavia Hills

Elementary West, are found in every aspect of the school's culture. From classroom conversations to school behavioral expectations, core values make up the foundation of our schools' approach to character development.

Vestavia Hills Schools excel in character education. Multiple schools, including the district itself, have received "Promising Practices" recognition from Character.org, a national organization advocating for character education in schools. These "Promising Practices" encompass various programs and initiatives started by the schools to create a culture of good character in all aspects of school life. Four schools — Vestavia Hills Elementary Cahaba Heights, Vestavia Hills Elementary East, Vestavia Hills Elementary Liberty Park and Vestavia Hills Elementary West — have been named Alabama State Schools of Character in the past five years. Cahaba Heights, East and West were also named National Schools of Character.

STEM Learning Taking Shape for 2024-25





Vestavia Hills City Schools' mission is to provide every student the opportunity to learn without limits. Our goal is that students find value and meaning in what they learn and that we exceed the expectations of the stakeholders in our community. This compels us to continually improve, adapt and innovate our academic programming to meet the needs of our students, community and local workforce.

We believe that science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) is an important investment in strengthening the foundation for students to be prepared for the next steps in their education and career choices. Vestavia Hills City Schools envisions an innovative and systemic approach to STEM education that meets our students at the nexus of their academic needs and career interests.

Our plan next school year is to elevate STEM programming systemwide. Beginning in the 2024-25 school year, all students in grades K-5 will participate in a STEM class as a weekly "special," similar to art and music classes. Elementary students will meet in STEM class to engage in lessons that connect math and science to real-

> world scenarios. In addition, we will offer accelerated math courses in our middle schools for students who progress through the standards at a more rapid pace. Finally, we plan to expand our engineering and health science programs for high school students.

VHCS endeavors to sustain a robust K-12 STEM learning experience for all students through creative partnerships. The school system has secured commitments from three corporate partners – Lathan and Associates, Schneider Electric and Shipt – to support the initial purchases of curriculum, technology, resources and furniture for the STEM classrooms. We look forward to announcing additional community partners in the coming weeks that will help us achieve a goal of \$400,000 for these start-up costs.

Smoke Detectors Save Lives

Smoke detectors are one of the most important safety devices in your home and are proven to save lives when minutes matter. Smoke is the most common cause of fire deaths, leading to injuries long before flames can harm you. According to the National Fire Protection Association, more than 1/3 of home fire deaths occur from fires where no smoke detector is present. Following are a few tips to consider to make sure you get the most out of your detectors.

- Install detectors on every level of your home and outside each sleeping area.
- Test all smoke detectors once a month by pushing the test button.
- Change the batteries twice per year. It helps most people to change them when they change their clocks.
- Replace detectors every 10 years.

The Vestavia Hills Fire Department wants you to stay safe in case of a fire. Make smoke detectors part of your fire safety plan. If your detectors alarm you, exit the structure as quickly as possible, shutting the doors behind you, and do not re-enter for any reason. Having working smoke detectors and a fire safety plan in place greatly increases the chance of survival in case of a fire inside your home.


